Saturday, April 28, I - 3pm

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

Galion Public Library

Between the Stacks Newsletter Winter 2012





For the past 236 years, the United States believed that every citizen, rich or poor, young or old, had a vital right to a public library. They believed every citizen had a right to educate themselves to create a better life for themselves and their family. They believed every citizen had a right to become proficient in the arts and culture. They believed every citizen could come to the Library to read a newspaper and take out items just to enjoy. Libraries were the great equalizer. You could come to the Library even if you had no money, no home or no Internet connection.

Gradually, we are seeing that change. Once valued institutions such as public libraries are finding themselves devalued and forgotten. Look at our funding. In 1985 Ohio was lauded because our congress voted in state funding for libraries so Ohio would always have a strong public library system. Now, they want it back. We're working on a budget now that we had in 1997, more than 15 years ago, and the Ohio congress wants us to have already beleaguered local citizens pay for the privilege of a public library. In these times, it's like saying "we give you a choice…groceries or a library.

The worst of it is the attitude of big business. Publishers who for years supported and encouraged libraries, are now afraid that they will lose money if they give us access to e-books. Of the "Big Six" publishers, four of them are putting restrictions on e-books for libraries. They will only sell so many to libraries, or only allow a short window of purchase. Some require us to "re-buy" the book after 26 circulations. Considering a new James Patterson can have several hundred holds, Libraries can end up re-purchasing the same title 15 to 20 times (or more) before the initial holds are done. Just yesterday another of the Big Six, Penguin Group, announced that they will NO LONGER SELL E-BOOKS TO LIBRARIES! Penguin Group, by the way, had the hottest selling book this year with Kathryn Stockett's The Help. Random House is now the only one of the Big Six that is still standing with the public libraries and supporting full access for public libraries. How long can they hold up against the other five? How long can Libraries hold up when they are no longer allowed to keep up with the current formats??
