Message from the Director

In June, I had the honor to represent the Galion Public Library in Washington D.C., at the annual conference of the American Library Association. Between attending programs and visiting the exhibit area, I couldn't help but come away with the impression that a library in the United States of America in 2007 should be this modern, office-looking building with a coffee bar, a video gaming room for teens, interactive activities for children, and a vast array of technological equipment for both staff and patrons everywhere.



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After four days of being bombarded with these messages I was quite interested in hearing the conference's closing speaker, author and a public radio personality, Garrison Keillor, share his insights about libraries. After a few opening pleasantries, he shared his view of libraries being "a cathedral of quietness...where silence is freedom." You could hear an audible gasp from some librarians in the audience. Many were not happy to hear that "Carnegie library buildings [like ours] are irreplaceable and the folks in suits and ties who tear them down and replace them with low warehouse-looking buildings are true vandals." It was encouraging for me to hear stated that "libraries should always be a place where serious people go to have the freedom to think without anybody poking and prodding them, in the company of other serious people who sit silently around us and yet encourage us in our own pursuits and projects."

I heard comments in the audience after the talk and on electronic newsgroups later that they were not pleased to hear a speaker not embracing all the "new" things libraries are doing. Personally, I felt sad that so many have forgotten or never seemed to have grasped what a true public library is all about. As long as I'm director here in Galion you can be sure that the library will remain a library, and not a coffee bar or video gaming arcade or computer lab.
